Tiffany Greene is a play-by-play commentator for ESPN, covering a variety of collegiate sports including basketball, football, softball and volleyball. She is the first African-American woman to serve as a play-by-play commentator for college football on ESPN.

Greene has called a number of postseason games including the NCAA Women's Division I Basketball Tournament, NCAA Softball Regional and Super Regionals, as well as NCAA Volleyball Regionals.

Greene originally began working with ESPN as a college football sideline reporter in 2012. She has since worked on the Women's College World Series, Air Force Reserve Celebration Bowl on ABC and multiple bowl games.

Jay Walker joined ESPN in 2005 as a college football analyst. He has called the ESPNU Thursday Night games for the last four years, in addition to being a studio analyst for the last two years. He has also been an analyst on College Football Overdrive.

Walker started his television career with BET and then joined the now defunct MBC Network from 2002-05.

Out of college, Walker was drafted in the seventh round in 1994 by the New England Patriots, where he played for two seasons. He also spent two years with the Minnesota Vikings.

Walker was drafted out of high school to be a pitcher in the California Angels organization's minor league team, one of a handful of players to play both minor league baseball and in the NFL. While playing in the minors, Walker decided to pursue his passion for football and was recruited as a quarterback to Long Beach State and even-

Quint Kessenich began at ESPN in 1993 covering men's lacrosse. He currently serves as a lacrosse analyst and college sports reporter, working on football and wrestling.

Kessenich works on television's most extensive college lacrosse package — featuring regular-season action and the NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Championship, an event he has covered since 1995. He also works as an analyst on Major League Lacrosse games on ESPN2 and ESPN3.

Under his reporting duties, Kessenich covers college football and the NCAA Division I Wrestling Championship.

Since joining the company, his responsibilities expanded to high school football, men's college basketball and various NCAA championships, including track and field, and soccer. He established the ESPNU Lacrosse Podcast in 2010, and it quickly became the industry leader for lacrosse news. He was also a frequent contributor to ESPNU.com. In addition, he has covered the Kentucky Derby, Prior to ESPN, Greene honed her skills as a playby-play announcer and sports reporter at Bright House Sports Network in the Orlando and Tampa Bay markets. During that time, she was the playby-play announcer for the inaugural season of BIG EAST women's basketball on Fox Sports 1.

Greene is a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.,LinksIncorporated and the National Association of Black Journalists. She began her on-air career in 2004 as a one-man band reporter at WJCL/WTGS, and later, WTOC in Savannah, Georgia.

Greene earned her Bachelor's degree in Broadcast Journalism from the Florida A&M University. She serves as the FAMU School of Journalism & Graphic Communication Board of Visitors co-chair.

tually transferred to Howard University after football was cut as a sport at Long Beach. At Howard, Walker led the team to their first playoff berth in team history and was named an All-American, to the All-MEAC Team twice and was the I-AA football player of the year by Sports Illustrated. That year, 1993, Howard earned its only undefeated season in program history.

A native of Los Angeles, Walker is a 1994 graduate from Howard with a political science degree. In 2005, he was inducted into the Howard University Athletics Hall of Fame, and most recently, he was named to the MEAC/SWAC All-Time Greatest Team.

Currently, Walker is CEO and President of Walker Financial Services and has been a member of the House of Delegates in Maryland since 1997. He serves on the House Ways and Means Committee and its education and finance resources subcommittees. He is also a member of the Legislative Black Caucus of Maryland.

Kessenich contributes to Inside Lacrosse Magazine, and is actively involved with "First Stick", a nonprofit that introduces urban schools and athletes to the game of lacrosse. He was also a columnist on college lacrosse for the Baltimore Sun.

Kessenich played one year of professional lacrosse with the Baltimore Thunder in 1999, and at the amateur level for the storied Mount Washington Lacrosse Club.

A four-time All-American goalkeeper, Kessenich was a two-time winner of the Ensign C. Markland Kelly, Jr., Award as the nation's best goalie. A 1990 graduate of Johns Hopkins University, Kessenich remained in Baltimore, where he has been an assistant lacrosse coach at the Boys' Latin School, a perennial national power since 1992.

He is a member of the Johns Hopkins Athletic Hall of Fame, as well as the Long Island Chapter and the Baltimore Chapter of USA Lacrosse Hall of Fame.







T.C. TAYLOR, CHENNIS BERRY LEAD THEIR PROGRAMS TO A CLASSIC REMATCH

This year's matchup has the makings of what could be one of the most exciting Cricket Celebration Bowls in its nine-year history. It features two programs in South Carolina State from the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) and Jackson State from the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC), with storied pasts, who come in playing some of the best football at the right time. It should be a special treat for HBCU football fans, who will find out who is the 2024 Black National champion. The game will take place on Saturday, December 14, at the Mercedes-Benz Stadium in Atlanta. GA. It will be broadcast live on ABC.

For starters, there are a number of intriguing story lines in this marquee matchup. The two coaches, SC State's Chennis Berry and Jackson State's TC Taylor, are both Coaches of the Year in their respective conferences, and they are also finalists for the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year that goes to the top FCS coach.

South Carolina State (9-2 overall, 5-0 in the MEAC), ranked Number 23 in the FCS national poll, reached this game in surprising fashion. The Bulldogs were picked to finish fourth in the MEAC in the preseason polls. Much of the doubt was predicated on the hiring of a new coach in Chennis Berry, who succeeded the legendary Oliver "Buddy" Pough, who had set a high standard for football in the HBCUs.

It must be noted that Berry had much success at Benedict College, where he led the program to back-to-back SIAC titles and NCAA Division 2 playoff appearances the past two years. Still, to some, there was doubt that he could make the transition from Division 2 to the Division 1 FCS level. Well, apparently Berry did not get that memo. Never once lacking in confidence, Berry had other ideas. Knowing that there was a need to have players who knew his system to turn things around, he brought in several transfers, including a key in graduate quarterback Eric Phoenix, a finalist for the prestigious Walter Payton Award, given to the top offensive player in the FCS.

Much to everyone's surprise, except Berry's, the Bulldogs not just won the MEAC, they pretty much dominated it, going undefeated (5-0) in league play. They come into the game, riding an eight-game win streak, during which they are averaging over 42 points during that stretch.



They showcased impressive growth, exceeding preseason expectations and revitalizing the program's national relevance. This season also secured SC State's first Celebration Bowl game appearance since 2021.

Berry notes that the defining moment for SC State's success was its win over state rival, the Citadel at the Citadel early in the season.

The Bulldogs have done it with a balanced and explosive attack on offense and a solid all-around defense, led by one of the top defensive linemen in the country.

The high-flying offense combines the running of junior running backs KZ Adams and Deondra Duehart and Phoenix, who have accounted for almost 1,200 yards and 14 TDs on the ground. The offensive front is one of the best in the FCS and is anchored by seniors Nick Taiste and Eric Brown, Jr., and sophomore Tray Franklin. Taiste was named the MEAC offensive Lineman of the Year.

Phoenix has been the key to having this high-octane offense run on all cylinders. He came to SC State from Murray State, but he was familiar with Coach Berry's system after having played for him at Benedict before his transfer to Murray State. The graduate signal caller completed 170 of 261 for 2,460 yards, 20 TDs and only seven interceptions. He is a first team All-MEAC selection and a strong favorite for Offensive Player of the Year.

Phoenix has had the luxury of having four dangerous receivers in sophomore Caden High, seniors Justin Smith-Brown and Einaj Carter, and graduate tight end Keshawn Toney, who as a quartet combined for almost 2,500 yards and 20 TDs on the season. High, Smith-Brown and Toney were first team All-MEAC selections.

The SC State defense has been equally dominant, led by All-American candidate Ashaad Hall. The Buck Buchanan finalist and a first team All-MEAC selection is one of the top defensive linemen in the FCS. On the season, he wreaked havoc against opposing offenses, recording 40 tackles, 14 tackles for loss, 11 sacks, 3 forced fumbles and a fumble recovery.

His strong supporting cast includes senior Jayden Broughton (23 solos, 13.5 tackles for loss and 8.5 sacks), graduate linebacker Aaron Smith (78 tackles 7.5 tackles for loss and a sack) and junior defensive back Diego Addison, a ballhawk in the secondary who has 44 tackles to go along 7 pass breakups and 3 interceptions.

The Bulldogs' special teams are solid with senior punter Dyson Roberts and



red-shirt freshman placekicker Kyle Gallegos having fine seasons. Roberts averaged 42 yards per punt, with 14 landing inside the opponents' 20-yard line. A first team All-MEAC selection, Gallegos converted on 9 of 14 attempts with a long of 42 yards.

The Tigers are back in the Celebration Bowl after a two-year hiatus. Jackson State (11-2 overall, 8-0 in the SWAC) also comes into the game, playing its best football after defeating Southern University 41-13 in the SWAC championship last Saturday. The Tigers have won nine in a row and are averaging 40 points per game during the streak to rank among the best in the FCS in scoring.

This is Taylor's third appearance as a coach in the Celebration Bowl, but his first as a head coach. Under his leadership, the former Tiger standout, has led the Tigers to a 13-3 SWAC record since he took over the reins.

The Tigers are similar to the Bulldogs, as they have combined an effective and balanced offense, one of the top defenses in the FCS and a lethal weapon on special teams.

On the offensive side of the ball, JSU relies on the running of graduate running back Irv Mulligan, who led the SWAC in rushing with 1,088 yards on 157 carries for 16 TDs. The native from Beaufort, SC, was named the SWAC Offensive Player of the Year. Freshman Travis Terrell, Jr. (64 carries, 412 yards, 3 TDs) and junior quarterback Jacobian Morgan of Canton, MS, added 299 yards and 6 TDs to keep the defenses honest.

But it was as a passer where Morgan was most efficient, completing 146 of 231 for almost 2,000 yards, 19 TDs and only six interceptions.

A Syracuse transfer, Morgan was able to spread the ball around to receivers, red-shirt sophomore Joanes Fortilien, Isaiah Spencer and Ja'Naylon Dupree, who combined for over 1,400 yards and 17 TDs.

Mulligan and Morgan have had the luxury of operating behind a veteran offensive line, anchored by All-SWAC performers, junior D'Andre Townes-

Jackson State is led on defense by Joshua Nobles and senior defensive back Ke'Vric Wiggins, Jr., first team All-SWAC selections. Nobles, a junior defensive lineman from Camden. NJ. proved to be one of the most dominant. players on the unit with 51 tackles. 11 tackles for loss, 9 sacks and 2 fumble recoveries. Teammates junior defensive lineman Tru Thompson, graduate defensive back Robert McDaniel and Wiggins give the Tigers a stout defense that was ranked in the Top 10 in several FCS statistical categories.

Graduate punter/placekicker Matt Noll and red-shirt punter/placekicker Gerardo Baeza, both second team All-SWAC selections, combine to give the Tigers a solid kicking game. Noll averaged over 42 yards per punts, with six of 50 yards or more and 15 landing inside the opponents' 20-yards line. Baeza connected on 20 of 26 field goal attempts including a long of 48 yards.

Yet the most potent weapon in the Tigers' arsenal and a possible X factor in this game could be Terrell, Jr. The freshman running back from Atlanta, GA, finished 3rd in the nation in punt returns with a 17.3 yard per return average and 4th in the country in both kick returns and combined kick returns. He is one of only two players in the FCS to have returned two kicks for TDs and is a threat to take it to the house any time he touches the ball. He is a finalist for the Jerry Rice Award, presented to the Top freshman in the FCS.

OTHER NOTES: This is Jackson State's third appearance in the Cricket Celebration Bowl. The Tigers last played in 2022 and dropped a 41-34 decision to North Carolina Central. This is SC State's second trip. The Bulldogs played Jackson State in 2021 and came away with a 31-10 decision. The MEAC holds a 6-2 advantage in the series which started in 2015. The Florida A&M win over Howard in the Celebration Bowl last year snapped a six-game win streak by the MEAC. The game features outstanding individual players who are in the running for National Players of the Year at their positions.



One of the greatest Jackson State Football Tigers to ever don the Blue and White has ascended to the position of Head Coach at his alma mater. T.C. Taylor was been named the 22nd head coach for JSU football. He officially took the reins of the program following the conclusion of the 2022 Celebration Bowl.

The former JSU quarterback and wide receiver has been a part of the Jackson State football staff since 2019, coaching tight ends and wide receivers, and has played a key role in an historic run over the past two seasons of Tiger football. JSU posted a 23-3 record over the previous two seasons prior to Taylor taking over the program, winning back-to-back Southwestern Athletic Conference championships and posting consecutive undefeated conference seasons before finishing 7-4 in 2023.

In his first season at the helm of the Tigers, Taylor led the team to a second-place finish in the East Division. They finished fourth in the conference in scoring at 27.3 points per game and third in rushing with 1,778 yards on 397 attempts for an average of 161.6 yards per game. They also finished second in passing at 2277 yards per game, and were the best team offensively in the conference at 389.4 yards per game. Defensively, the team finished fifth in the conference in scoring and fourth in total defense.

As an assistant coach at JSU, Taylor has helped develop some of the best receivers in the SWAC. During the abbreviated Spring 2021 season, he tutored WR Daylen Baldwin, who led the SWAC in receiving yards (540) and touchdowns (seven). During the Fall 2021 season. Malachi Wideman tied for the conference lead with 12 touchdown receptions, while Keith Corbin ranked second in both receptions (69) and yards (921) and tied for seventh in touchdowns, In 2022, Dallas Daniels ranked second in the SWAC in receptions (60), third in receiving yards (666), and fourth in touchdowns (six). Alma Mater Jackson State (2005) Record at JSU 18-6 (2nd Season)

Career Record 18-6 (2nd Season) ranked third in the SWAC in receptions (59) and third in both receiving yards (705) and receiving touchdowns (10). Prior to the 2022 season, Taylor was selected for an NFL coaching fellowship with the Tennessee Titans.

A native of McComb, Miss., Taylor played quarterback and wide receiver at Jackson State from 1998-2001, starting off as a signal caller for two-and-a-half seasons before switching to wide receiver. In just 19 games as a receiver, he amassed 188 catches for 1,793 yards. As a senior at Jackson State, Taylor broke the JSU single-season record with 84 receptions for 1,234 yards and 11 touchdowns, earning NCAA Division I-AA Third-Team All-America honors from The Sports Network and First-Team Black College All-America recognition from Sheridan Broadcasting Network. He was also the runner-up

for the 2001 Conerly Trophy, presented to Mississippi's top college football player, behind Eli Manning.

Prior to returning to JSU as assistant coach in 2019,

Taylor coached at North Carolina Central from 2014-18, where he coached quarterbacks and served as offensive coordinator.

At NCCU, Taylor helped guide the Eagles to three MEAC championships (2014, 2015, 2016), and in 2016 went unbeaten in conference play and qualified for the Air Force Reserve Celebration Bowl.

In 2016 and under Taylor's guidance, NCCU set a record for total offense in a single season (4,614). Also, in 2014, Taylor's unit set a program record for passes completed in a season (227). From 2014-18, Taylor coached 28 All-MEAC offensive players and five All-Americans. In 2016 and under Taylor's tutoring, Malcolm Bell was a finalist for the 2016 Black College Football Player of the Year.

Bell was also a three-time All-MEAC quarterback (2014, 2015, 2016) and set the program record for total offense (7,844 yards) and career completion percentage (56.6 percent) and was second in passing yards (6,340).

Taylor spent the prior two seasons (2012-13) at Texas Southern University as wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator. From 2005-11, he coached at Coahoma Community College in Clarksdale, Miss., starting as the quarterbacks and wide receivers coach and spending the final six years as offensive coordinator. His offenses ranked among the top five in Mississippi junior colleges in total yards for four straight seasons from 2007-10.

Taylor signed as a rookie free agent with the New England Patriots in 2002, played wide receiver for the NFL Europe World Bowl XI champion Frankfurt Galaxy in 2003, and participated in the 2003 NFL preseason with the Detroit Lions, before a nagging injury ended his playing career.

Taylor graduated from Jackson State with a bachelor's degree in health, physical education and recreation in 2005. He is married to Dawn, and they have two sons, Tre and Tylan.

SEASON RECAP



Jackson State entered the 2024 season picked in the middle of the pack, not in the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC). but in the SWAC East Division behind Alabama State and Florida A&M. How did they respond? The Tigers won consecutive eight games, once conference play started, finishing 8-0 in conference play and finished the regular season with nine straight wins on their way to capturing the conference championship and a berth in the 2024 Cricket Celebration Bowl.

The Tigers split the first four games of the season, all nonconference games, with several players sitting out parts of those four games rehabbing injuries before conference play started. Following a non-conference loss to Grambling State, Jackson State responded with a healthy Irv Mulligan at running back and Jacobian Morgan at quarterback on offense paired with a stingy second-half defense. And they did so missing three starting receivers (Fabian McCray, Kobe Paul, and Rico Powers, Jr.), two

of the top running backs (J.D. Martin and Ahmad Miller), a projected starter at tight end (Jency Riley), and a starting defensive tackle (Athen Smith), all lost to season-ending injuries.

Mulligan finished the year with 1,174 yards on 180 carries with 11 touchdowns, averaging 106.7 yards per game to lead a Tiger offense that rushed for 2,815 yards on the ground averaging 216.5 yards per game. Morgan led four quarterbacks with 2,003 yards passing on







148-of-235 with 19 touchdowns and seven interceptions, while Cam'Ron McCoy — the starter in three of the first games added 310 yards, and SWAC Championship Offensive MVP Zy McDonald added 104 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

Joanes Fortilien and Isaiah Spencer led a receiving corps that helped Jackson State average 37.1 points per game and 402.5 yards of total offense per game.

Meanwhile, on defense, the Tigers used a balanced attack that resulted in 21 turnovers, 34 sacks, and 91 tackles for loss. Reid Pulliam led the team with 63 tackles, while Joshua Nobles added 56 (10 sacks), Jeremiah Williams 55. and Robert McDaniel 53 (three interceptions). The defense held opponents to just 17.9 points per game over 13 games. They also held their eight opponents to just 13 total points in the fourth quarter, holding five of their opponents scoreless in the final quarter. They also held five opponents to under 100 yards rushing including a season-low 29 allowed against Southern, and also held Alabama State to just four yards passing in a win.

Jackson State averaged 39.7 points per game over the last nine games, including scoring 30 or more points in eight of the nine, with five of those games scoring 40 or more. Defensively, the Tigers held opponents to 17 or fewer points in the last six games, including a seasonlow three against UAPB. Not to mention, the Tigers on special teams have been just that special. Travis Terrell, Jr., led the nation with a pair of kick returns for touchdowns. Matt Noll landed nearly half of his punts inside the 20, and Gerardo Baeza set a new single-season record with 22 field goals.

The season has been full of rewards for the Tigers with 11 players named all-conference, the SWAC Coach of the Year (T.C. Taylor), Offensive Player of the Year (Mulligan), and Freshman of the Year (Terrell). They also had three players named All-American, an Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Finalist (Taylor), Walter Payton Player of the Year Finalist (Mulligan), Jerry Rice Freshman of the Year Finalist (Terrell), and HBCU+ National Player of the Year Finalist (Mulligan).

The conference championship is the third in four years for Jackson State and the first under Taylor, who will be coaching in his fourth Celebration Bowl after coaching in one as an assistant at North Carolina Central and another two as an assistant at Jackson State. The second-year head coach has rebuilt a program decimated by transfers with 18 victories in two years including 13 in conference play.

The Tigers enter the weekend looking for their first Celebration Bowl victory after losses to South Carolina State and North Carolina Central, and are in search of their fourth HBCU National Championship.







Chennis Berry was named head football coach at South Carolina State University on December 16th, 2023. The former Benedict College (Columbia, SC) head coach succeeded the iconic Coach Oliver "Buddy" Pough, the winningest coach in Bulldog football history, who retired as head football coach at the end of the 2023 season after 22 seasons at the helm and 151 wins.

'Go Bulldogs," Berry said at the press conference announcing his hiring. 'My family and I are super excited to be joining the SC State Bulldog family. The proud history, tradition, and commitment to excellence, both on and off the field, are the driving forces to our excitement! It's a great day to be a Bulldog."

No stranger to Historically Black Colleges, Berry takes over at SC State after three seasons at Benedict, where he amassed a 27–7 record, went undefeated in the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (SIAC) and earned postseason berths in the Division II playoffs each of the last two seasons.

Prior to his stint at Benedict, he served seven seasons from 2013-19 as assistant head coach and offensive coordinator at Southern University. The Jaguars had a winning record every season and the offense under Berry's guidance set numerous schools and SWAC conference records.

His coaching resume also includes stops at Howard University, North Carolina A&T, Morris Brown, Kentucky State and Fort Valley State. He also served internships with six different NFL teams.

While at Southern, Berry helped direct one of the most prolific offenses in the country. The Jaguars led the SWAC in rushing and ranked 13th in the nation. Southern also averaged more than 33 points per game, ranking 25th in the nation in scoring. In 2016, the Jaguars ranked fifth in the nation in scoring with 39.8 points per game and were 11th nationally in total offense. Individually, running back Lenard Tillery set the SWAC single- season rushing record and became the all-time leading runner in conference history. As an of-



Career Record 36-9 (4th Season) fensive line coach, Berry guided the Jaguars to no lower than 12th in the nation in sacks allowed over three seasons. During his time at Southern, Berry mentored ten offensive linemen who earned All-SWAC recognition and five who garnered All-America honors.

Before joining Southern, Berry spent two seasons from 2011-12 as the co-offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Howard University. The offensive line was key to the Bison's success as Howard finished second in the MEAC with a 365.4 yards per game average. Howard was also second in the league in rushing with 221.5 yards per game. Those accomplishments led to four Howard offensive linemen earning All-MEAC honors, and the offensive line blocked for the MEAC's leading rusher.

Prior to Howard, Berry served two years from 2009-10 as the associate head coach/offensive coordinator/offensive line coach at North Carolina A&T. Berry's offense had one of the top rushing attacks in the MEAC during both his seasons with the Aggies. He also had one of his early coaching stops at NC A&T, serving

as offensive line coach from 2003-05. Over his first two seasons with the Aggies, he served as the offensive line coach. A strong running game led the Aggies to the 2003 MEAC

Championship and a NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision playoff berth.

As part of the NFL's Minority Internship Program, Berry interned with six different NFL teams, including the Jacksonville Jaguars, Indianapolis Colts, Cleveland Browns, Detroit Lions, San Diego Chargers and Chicago Bears. In 2009, he participated in the NCAA Expert Coaches Academy Forum. The program prepares young minority assistant coaches for head coaching positions.

Berry served as Morgan State's offensive coordinator and offensive line coach from 2006-2008. During Berry's time there, the Bears possessed one of the most envied running games in the MEAC. In each of his three seasons with Morgan State, the Bears' rushing offense ranked in the top 50 nationally.

Berry began his career at Morris Brown College in Atlanta in 1996 where he coached under Joe Crosby. After one season with Morris Brown, Berry became the offensive line and tight ends coach, as well as the strength and conditioning coordinator, at Kentucky State under George Small in 1997.

Behind Berry's strong offensive line at Kentucky State, Alvon Brown broke several school and national Division II records.

Brown broke the single-season rushing record at KSU twice and finished his career as the school's all-time leading rusher. He also rushed for 405 yards in a game on September 16, 2000, which at the time, was a Division II single-game record. Berry's offensive line also helped Brown win the SIAC Player and Back of the Year awards on two occasions.

In 2001, Berry became the assistant head coach at Fort Valley State. He was responsible for coaching the Wildcats' offensive linemen and tight ends. His impact at FVSU was immediately felt as Philip Shiflet earned SIAC Offensive Lineman of the Year and first-team Sheridan All-American honors in 2001.

Berry holds a master's degree in public administration from Kentucky State University and received his bachelor's degree in business administration from Savannah State University. As a player at Savannah State, he earned First Team All-SIAC accolades at offensive tackle and was named a Black College Honorable Mention All-American in 1994. He also served as Savannah State's team captain.

Berry is married to Mrs. Ramille Berry, and they have four children, Jasmin, Mia, Chennis III and Channing.

SEASON RECAP



South Carolina State University captured its 19th Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) Championship this season with a perfect 5-0 league mark and had a 9-2 overall record under first-year head coach Chennis Berry.

The Bulldogs immediately clinched a berth in the Celebration Bowl, beating every conference contender that came their way. The dominant victories, defensive proficiency, balanced offensive attack, and a conference-clinching regular-season victory against the second-best team in the conference is a story we have seen played out before. A host of Bulldogs were named to the All-MEAC postseason team and earned numerous other accolades, including All-America honors, in this historic run back to championship dominance and a second appearance in four seasons in the prestigious Celebration Bowl, which crowns the HBCU Division I Champion.

SC State is led by All-American offensive lineman Nick Taiste, named the 2024 MEAC Offensive Lineman of the Year. His dominance upfront this year proved to be a pivotal driving force behind the Bulldogs' prolific offense, teaming with fellow senior linemen Cam Johnson and Eric Brown, Jr. The three of them have over 48 consecutive starts under their belt during their careers.

This trio is returning to the scene (Mercedes-Benz Stadium) of one of SC State's most impressive victories where, as freshmen, they helped South Carolina State knock off perennial power and heavily-favored Jackson State 31-10 to claim their first Cricket Wireless Celebration Bowl Championship under legendary coach Buddy Pough, who retired after the 2023 campaign after 21 years at the helm.

The offense alone has racked up 4,609-yards (426.24 yards per game) and 53 touchdowns, led by MEAC Offensive Player of the Year, Eric Phoenix. Phoenix alone set historic marks and is bidding to add his name in the Bulldog Record books, as he is on pace to break the singleseason passing yard record – 2,507 yards – established by current SC State Hall of Fame quarterback Malcolm in 2009.

The top signal caller for the Bulldogs this season played in 10 games and has completed 170-of-261-7 (65.13%) for 2,460-yards and 20 touchdowns, with a long of 75-yards, averaging 246.0 yards passing per game. Backup quarterback Ryan Stubblefield proved to be a solid contributor for Coach Berry's team, connecting on 33-of-46 for 454-yards and 5 TDs in six games.

Sophomore Caden High, leader of a talented trio that also includes Justin Smith-Brown and Einaj Carter, ranks among the best in the MEAC. High is the league leader with 58 catches for 892-yards and 7 TDs, while Smith-Brown is 2nd with 49 catches for 725-yards and 4 TDs, followed by Carter with 38 receptions for 592-yards and 6 TDs. The Bulldog backfield this season has loads of talent and depth, giving SC State an outstanding running attack. The MEAC's most powerful ground game features the likes of KZ Adams with 95 carries for 497-yards and 5 TDs, along with Deondra Duehart with 111 rushes for 444-yards and 7 TDs. Mix in Phoenix, a dual threat quarterback, who has 77 rushes for 225-yards and two touchdowns, along with heralded runner Tyler Smith, who came on strong down the stretch for the Bulldogs.

When you think of South Carolina State dominance throughout the years, look no further than the Bulldog defense led by All-MEAC linebacker Aaron Smith, the leader on the team in tackles with 78 (41 solo), 7.5 tackles for loss for 19-yards, and defensive back Diego Addison, the leader in the Bulldog secondary with 44.0 (28 solo) tackles, 4.0 tackles for loss, a teamleading 3 interceptions and seven (7) pass breakups.

Defensive end Ashaad "Bill" Hall leads the defensive front and is the nation's leader in sacks with 11.0 (1st in FCS and MEAC) for 56-yards along with 14.0 (1st in MEAC) tackles for loss for 82-yards. Also playing a major role on the Bulldog defense is senior defensive tackle Jayden Broughton with 34 tackles (23 solo) and 13.5 tackles for loss for 48-yards and 8 sacks.

Other key members of the defensive unit are Linebacker Jadin Jones, who is third on the team in tackles with 43.0 (21 solo), and defensive lineman John Hannibal, who made an immediate impact upon arrival with 37.0 (22 solo) tackles, 8.0 tackles for loss and 3 sacks.

Redshirt senior punter Dyson Roberts leads the special team's unit and ranks among the best in the conference with 44 punts for 1,847-yards, an average of 41.98 yards per punt with a long of 72-yards with five touchbacks, 14 punts inside the 20-yard line and seven (7) over 50+.

The future is looking bright with redshirt freshman placekicker Kyle Gallegos, an Arkansas transfer, who in his first year has earned several All-MEAC honors and was a First Team All-MEAC selection, finishing the season 9-of-14 on field goals, with a long of 42-yards, and 41-of-48 for PATs.



SONIC BOOM OF THE SOUTH



Although Dr. F. D. Hall served as director of the band, chorus, and orchestra in the 1920s, the marching band began in the 1940s, consisting of students from both Jackson State College and Lanier High School under the direction of Mr. Kermit Holly, Sr. The Jackson State University Marching Band, affectionately known as the "Sonic Boom of the South" is known for intricate, precision marching and the big band sound. The "Sonic Boom" also referred to as "Hollywood's Band of Choice," has performed many halftime appearances for the NFL/NBA including the Atlanta Falcons, Detroit Lions, New Orleans Saints, Cincinnati Bengals, and the NBA All-Star game in 1991. The "Boom" was featured in a

television special for Motown's 30th Anniversary and the 34th NAACP Image Awards, with a special guest performance by "Cedric the Entertainer." In May 2013, the band was featured in a HeadlineNewsspecialchronicling what it takes to become a drum major at Jackson State University. Since 2020, the band has been featured in several media outlets, nationally televised Pepsi commercial, featured on YouTube, and the virtual inauguration of President Joseph R. Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris.

Students in the band dubbed the Jackson State University Marching Band the "Sonic Boom of the South" in 1971. "The thrill of a thousand

eyes," were the words spoken by Dr. Jimmie James, Jr., at the onset of the "Prancing Jaycettes" in 1971. Shirley Middleton, a former majorette, initiated the concept of the majorettes abandoning their batons and dancing to popular musical selections. As the majorette sponsor, Shirley Middleton and the majorettes met with Dr. John A. Peoples, the University's sixth president, and requested that they be permitted to "put down their batons." In 1974, the band's theme song, "Get Ready," an old Motown favorite, was selected and three years after that, the "Tiger Run-On" was perfected. The "Tiger Run-On" is a fast, eye-catching shuffle that brings fans to their feet during

fans to their feet during halftime performances.

MARCHING 101

The South Carolina State "Marching 101" band is known from coast to coast. The members have entertained tens of thousands of spectators throughout the Southeast and millions by way of nationally televised events — including professional football games — with a unique style of marching that takes hours of practice to master.

Band members play without music scores, although only a percentage of the members are music majors. They are perpetually in motion with dance routines and geometric designs while remaining in step, and of course, playing music all the time.

The band's name, the "Marching 101" is a misnomer as the 2008 edition of the renowned group.

For many youngsters throughout the state, the band is South Carolina State University. They may not be aware of all of the academic opportunities of the institution, but they respond to the exciting music of the "Marching 101."

The band, which is currently under the direction of Dr. Patrick Moore, was organized in 1918 as a "regimental band," performing military drills and assisting with music in the college Sunday School and other special occasions.

In 1924, the late Reginald Thomason influenced the music presentation with concerts. From 1924 on, a succession of directors, including Thomason, influenced the growth of the band as it became a part of the Department of Music at the university. In the 1940s, the band shared uniforms with the ROTC brigade, and played in military ceremonies as well as collegiate functions. In 1955, the college band numbered around 45 members — about one-seventh

of today's number — and sported its own garnet and blue uniforms.

Moore, who took over as director in 2018, has continued the tradition of fine entertainment, especially at football games.

While other college football fans head for the concession stands at halftime, followers of the Bulldogs remain seated to enjoy the next exciting routines of the "Marching 101," which are always appropriate for the game.

The band learns a completely new show for every home game. Fans enthusiastically reward their excellent and breathtaking performances with applause and cheers.

Although most of the members hang up their uniforms when the football season is over, many of them will contribute their musical skills in various ways

After a touchdown run by FAMU's Terrell Jennings, Howard's Darrian Brokenburr sacked Moussa in the endzone for a safety and a 16-7 lead. Howard led 16-10 at the half but found themselves down by eight early in the fourth. The Bison reclaimed the lead 26-24 on a 34-yard field goal by Aaron Bickerton and a 27-yard interception return by Carson Hinton. But Moussa connected on a 38-yard strike to Jah'Marae Sheread to go up 30-26. An interception by the Rattlers' Isaiah Major ended

North Carolina Central quarterback Davius Richard scored on a one-yard sneak in overtime

to put the Eagles ahead 41-34, as the Eagles held on for their first championship win in the Cricket Celebration Bowl. The underdog Eagles rolled up 482 yards of total offense in the contest, with 276 coming on the ground. In front of a record crowd of 49,670, the Eagles took a 10-0 lead in the first seven minutes of the contest, before Jackson fought back to go ahead 14-10 early in the second period and led 21-17 at the half, in the contest that featured six lead changes. NCCU took a 34-27 lead on Davius Richard's one-yard run and a successful two-point conversion pass with 4:31 left in the fourth period, but Shedeur Sanders directed JSU on a 15-play, 81-yard scoring drive in the final four minutes of regulation, connecting with Travis Hunter on a 19-yard scoring pass with no time left on the clock to tie the game and force overtime. The Eagles scored a TD on their first possession in overtime, but Jackson State fell one-yard short in their attempt to tie the game. Richard completed 15 of 20 passes for 175 yards and a TD, while also rushing for 97 yards and two scores in the victory. The Eagle defense was paced by linebacker Khalil Baker with 10 tackles. Richard was named the

game's Offensive MVP and Baker the Defensive MVP in the contest. JSU quarterback Sanders had an impressive outing for the Tigers, completing 30 of 40 attempts for 349 yards and four touchdowns.

> In a stunning turn of events in the 2021 Cricket Celebration Bowl, the favorite Jackson State Tigers went down to the South Carolina State Bulldogs, 31-10 at Mercedes-Benz

Stadium before a bowl record 48,653 fans. Traditionally known for their great defensive units, South Carolina State held Jackson to Celebration Bowl lows in team rushing yards (19) and total yards (194), and their defensive effort resulted in the largest victory margin (21 points). The Tigers bolted out to a 7-0 first quarter lead on Shedeur Sanders' seven-yard strike to Keith Corbin III, with 7:24 left. S.C. State would then catch fire, outscoring the Tigers, 31-3 over the final three periods, seizing control of the game for good in the second quarter with a 10-point flurry in the final minutes, on a Corey Fields six-yard strike to Shaquan Davis with 2:08 left, followed by a 26-yard field goal by Gayvn Zimmerman with eight seconds left in the half. SCSU's Fields tossed four scoring passes, finishing with 164 yards (12 of 31, one INT), while JSU's Sanders passed for 175 yards (16 of 36, two INTs). SCSU's Shaquan Davis was the Bowl's Offensive MVP with five catches for 95 yards and three scores — a Celebration Bowl record. Decobie Durant earned

North Carolina A&T and Alcorn State combined to set several records at the 2019 Celebration Bowl at Mercedes-Benz Stadium, which the Aggies won 64-44. N.C. A&T captured its

second straight win and its fourth overall championship title. N.C. A&T and Alcorn were meeting for the second consecutive year and the third time in the five-year history of the event. Celebration Bowl records established, among others, were most points combined (108), most points in a quarter (49), most touchdown passes in a quarter (4 by NC A&T's Kylil Carter), most TDs in a game (6 by Carter), and most combined total yards (1,034). A&T quarterback Kylil Carter, the Celebration Bowl offensive MVP, had six touchdown passes — three in the third period — to tie an Aggie program record in leading his squad to the victory. He finished 18-30 for 364 yards, hitting four different receivers for touchdowns. Jacob Roberts, with six tackles including one for a loss, and an interception, was the game's defensive MVP. Alcorn scored first in this contest and led 10-7 with 10:16 left in the half. After the Aggies took at 24-10 lead into halftime, both teams exploded for a combined 49 points (seven TDs) in the third quarter. The Aggies, who scored on eight straight possessions, including seven touchdowns, needed only

13 seconds in the second half to add to their lead, when running back Jah-Maine Martin raced 75 yards on the first play of the third guarter for a score and a 31-17 lead. From there, each team would score three touchdowns apiece to end the quarter at 52-31.

this time under first-year head coach Sam Washington. The Aggies win gave the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) a 3-1 advantage in the bowl. The Aggies jumped out to a 17-6 lead through the first half of play, but Alcorn state scored 10 unanswered points in the third quarter to pull within one at 17-16. But just as the Braves appeared to have momentum, the Aggies' Malik Wilson took the kickoff at his 12, got to the outside and raced untouched for an 88-yard touchdown that put his team ahead 24-16. Alcorn State QB Noah Johnson led his team on a nine-play, 92-yard touchdown drive to move to 24-22 and put the Braves in a position to tie with a successful two-point conversion. On a run-pass option, Johnson rolled out and found Chris Blair for what appeared to be the tying 2-point conversion; however, it was called no good as he juggled the ball while going out of bounds. The Braves, despite the loss, rolled up 451 yards total offense, including 328 yards on the ground. Johnson completed 12-21 passes for 123 yards and ran

for 120 yards and two touchdowns on 14 rushing attempts. De'Shawn Waller led the Alcorn running attack with 167 yards. A&T's Raynard was named Offensive MVP, while Aggies free safety Richie Kittles picked up Defensive MVP honors.

North Carolina A&T State capped off an historic season with a 21-14 win over Grambling State in the 2017 Celebration Bowl. It was one of the most

highly anticipated matchups of the year. The Aggies were undefeated (11-0) heading into the Celebration Bowl, with staple wins on the road over nonconference opponents Gardner-Webb and UNC-Charlotte. Grambling, riding an 11-game win streak after dropping their first game of the season, was returning to the Celebration Bowl for a second straight season, defeating North Carolina Central in 2016. After a scoreless first quarter, both teams were able to put seven points on the board in the final five minutes of the half. But it was the Aggies who would strike first and last in the second half. Marquell Cartwright, who earned Offensive MVP honors, raced 29-yards for his second touchdown of the game, to give North Carolina A&T a 14-7 lead in the third. They would seal the victory in the final 1:42 with a seven-play, 56-yard drive, capped off by a one-yard touchdown run by quarterback Lamar Raynard. Franklin McClain III was the defensive MVP. With the win,

the Aggies completed a perfect 12-0 season, while the loss dropped Grambling's final 2017 record to 11-2. The Aggies became the first MEAC team to compile a 12-0 campaign, including the postseason.


